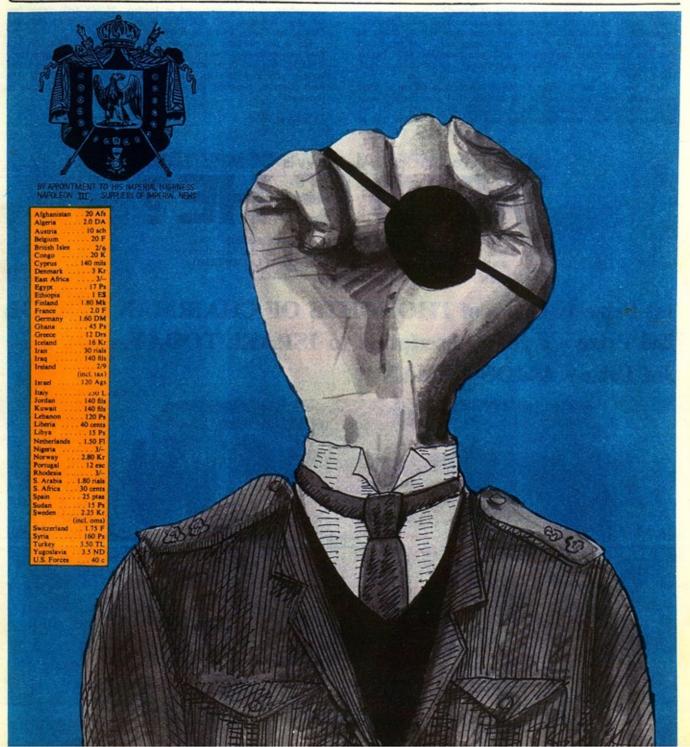

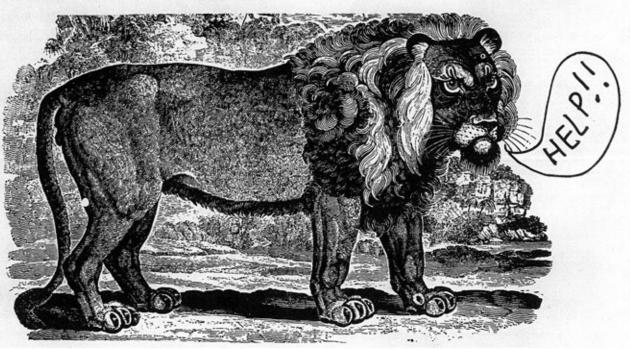

Ben Gurion: SETTLEMENT IN GUSH ETZION AND HEBRON

(Haaretz 30.4.68)

"At a meeting of the provisional government which took place a few days before the State of Israel was declared, the question arose as to whether to define the borders of the state," revealed David Ben-Gurion, M.K., at a meeting yesterday afternoon with Negrev newspapermen at the huts of Sdei Boker. Mr. Ben-Gurion continued, "Two lawyers, members of the provisional government, Rosen and Shitrit, said that it was necessary to define the borders. I opposed this, and stated that the Arabs had not accepted the resolution of 29th November and they would wage war on us. Therefore, the resolution did not exist for my part. I added that America, too, had not de-fined her borders in her Declaration of Independence. The matter was brought to a vote, and by a majority of five against four it was decided not to define the borders of the state."



Report on the indictment following the proclamation against the suppression of

human rights.

In April, 1968, a proclamation against the suppression of human rights was issued by a number of liberal Israeli intellectuals. The text reads as follows:

THE SUPPRESSION OF HUMAN RIGHTS MUST CEASE IN ISRAEL AND THE OCCUPIED TERRITORIES!

Details of certain things occurring in Israel and the occupied territories have

been published in the press:

Restriction orders, limitations and arrests without trial have recently been meted out to Israeli citizens, both Jews and Arabs. Capital punishment of curfew violators and the bombing of houses in towns and villages in the occupied territories are still going on. The families of workers and farmers, children, women and old folk are left without a roof and without a means of subsistence.

The stream of refugees and people fleeing from the Gaza Strip and the West Bank

flows on without end.

The number of Arabs deported on orders from the Israeli Military Governor is increasing. In a proclamation of protest published on the West Bank, it was stated, This system is contrary to international codes and the basic rights of people to live on their land and in their homes. The deportation of inhabitants against their will for political reasons is reminiscent of the days of British Colonial Rule."
WHERE DOES THIS SYSTEM LEAD
US, IF NOT TO AN ABYSS OF HATE?

Such actions can only increase the movement of resistance and rebellion. They will create victims on both sides and will lead to a new war with new victims.

The occupation of one people by another necessarily leads to moral degeneration and the liquidation of democracy on the ruling side also. In the end, people who oppress others will lose their own freedom. Jew! Remember the just men among the gentiles who helped us in times of distress.

When distress befalls your neighbour will you keep silent? RAISE YOUR VOICE IN PROTEST AGAINST THE SUP-PRESSION OF HUMAN RIGHTS!

This declaration was intended to be published in the daily press as an advertisement, but was rejected by the editors. It was then duplicated and distributed as a leaflet. One of the leaflets reached Paris and was published in Le Monde in April. Two weeks later it reached Moscow and was published in Pravda. Its publication in Pravda prompted a wave of protest all over Israel. Editorials, articles and letters to the editor flooded the press. The signatories were pressured to withdraw their signatures. Three people, including Ytzhak Dantziger, a famous sculptor and lecturer at Haifa Technion (who was awarded the Israeli prize for his contribution to the arts at the last Independence Day celebration), withdrew. Ylan Shliff, a member of Kibutz Negba and a student of Chinese language in the university, was called before a general meeting of the kibutz on 4th May, 1968. In a vote of 150 members, it was decided without opposition to demand that Mr. Shliff withdraw his name from the declaration and undertake to engage in no political activity in future without the consent of the kibutz. On his refusal to accept the decision of the majority, he was expelled from the kibutz.



Muchmad Yusuf Tzadik is a resident of Shfaram and is a second year student of English at the Hebrew University.

In the middle of December, 1967, he was arrested by the police on suspicionaccording to press reports-of having infiltrated into Jordan and contacted the Jordanian intelligence service. For his part Muchmad Tzadik claimed that these

allegations were false.

For a month Tzadik remained imprisoned on a magistrate's remand order. During this period no charge whatever was brought against him. On 10th January an administrative detention order was brought against Muchmad Tzadik for a period of three months. This order was served according to the emergency defence law of 1945, and he still remains in prison without trial and without any charge having been laid against him.

EBAN'S HOUSE WHITEWASHED

(Yedioth Aharonoth)
"Down with the occupation"—This slogan was painted on the house of Abba Eban, the Foreign Minister, in Jerusalem. Many slogans like that were found on other walls in the capital. The police have not yet succeeded in finding out who did the whitewashing.



WHITEWASHING IN JERUSALEM

Slogans in Hebrew saying "Down with the occupation" and "Down with Israeli Fascism" appeared in the last few days on walls of public buildings in Jerusalem. Besides the slogans there were also drawings of arrows pointing to the left.



Y. ALON: WE MADE A MISTAKE

When a delegation from the "Whole of Israel Movement" visited the minister Yegal Alon to receive more information about his peace plan, he told them: "The fact is that we should have, immediately after the last victory, annexed all the occupied territories and in this way finished the debate which is going on. If we had done this we would have been saved all the trouble. We made a mistake and now we have to pay for it. That's why my new plan . . . "

POLICE PREVENTED CLASH (Haaretz 4.7.68)

The police in Nathania yesterday prevented a clash following a demonstration by 50 members of Hashomer Hatzair (a youth organisation). The youngsters, who are staying in a Seminary in the Kibutz Maabaroth, marched yesterday in Nathania carrying posters protesting against colonisation in the occupied territories. An angry crowd that tried to snatch the posters were halted by the police.

ARAB WAITER BEATEN

(Haaretz 17.7.68)
Two youngsters were detained yesterday, suspected of beating an Arab steak-seller. They said that the reason for the beating was that their brother was killed by Arabs in Nablus. When the police van arrived, the policemen were attacked too. The brothers, Abraham and Ytzehak Alimro, were detained for 10 days until the end of the enquiries. It happened yesterday at midnight in Hertzel Street in Nathania. A crowd of passers-by gathered around but no one tried to interfere. When the policemen were beaten too and asked the

CINEMAS NOT RESPONDING

crowd for help, they were not answered.

(Haaretz 17.7.68)

The owners of cinema halls in Jerusalem are not responding to the police request to install equipment to exteninate suspicious objects that are discovered in cinema halls.

Two months ago the Jerusalem police asked the owners of cinema halls to install the above-mentioned equipment. The sug-



gestion was to have pits into which it would be possible to throw suspicious objects. Two months passed since but most of the cinema halls didn't do anything about it. Daniel Bareli, the district commander of the Jerusalem police, responded yesterday to a question about whether the police has the power to force the cinema hall owners to comply with the request. He added that he knows that the execution of the request is delayed and today he planned to make a round of inspection.

Mr. Israel Gut from the Cinema Halls Owners' Association in Jerusalem and the owner of Cinema Zion, said yesterday that he hadn't received practical instructions, either from the police or from the army, concerning how to construct such equipment. He added that this is apparently the reason that prevents the installation of such things in other cinemas also. He stressed that the cinema hall owners understand the importance of such installations and they are interested to put them in use as soon as possible.

The military commander in Nablus asked a group of Israeli visitors to refrain from singing humiliating songs whilst passing through the streets of the town.

The intervention of the military commander came after the mayor of Nablus, Mr. Hamdi Kenaan, complained that many of the people in the town are humiliated when Israelis pass through the streets singing songs about Nasser and Amman. Many of the people regard it is a provocation.



EVACUATION

(Haaretz 4.7.68)

The evacuation of the majority of the Arabs living in houses near the wailing wall will come to an end within a week.

It it still not clear what will be the destiny of the evacuated houses. In the beginning it was clear that the houses would be demolished so that the road along the wailing wall could be nicely shaped. But now it seems that the houses will not be demolished in the near future in order not to confront the praying platform with the archeological site (the houses are separating them) and also to make possible the passage to the Temple mount from the Mugrabite gate.



CONFISCATED AREA OF OLD JERUSALEM (Haaretz 7.7.68)

The up-to-date number of Arabs evacuated from the confiscated area in the old city (the Jewish quarter and parts of the Armenian quarter) has reached 200.

The evacuated people are receiving I.L.2000 on the average (about £235) for every room they evacuate. In practice the valuing of the buildings is done according to the social condition of the families and the number of children. A part of the evacuated people find accommodation in the nearby villages. Others returned to their houses in the refugee camps on the outskirts of the town (most of the inhabitants of the Jewish quarter are refugees).

In the confiscated area there are 6,000 people awaiting evacuation. The empty houses are closed. Some of them will be demolished and others will be rebuilt in the framework of the rehabilitation of the Jewish quarter, that was prepared by the Unit for the Inhabitation of Jerusalem, an interministerial committee nominated by the Directory of Israel Land. They are negotiating with the evacuated families about the sums of money to be paid.

Meanwhile, they have almost completed the evacuation of the Arabs from the tottering houses near the wailing wall. By now 15 families have been evacuated. Negotiations are still proceeding with two families, and one family still refuses to leave. The tottering houses are demolished now by hand. It is not yet known what will be done with the tall houses that are attached to the wailing wall. It became known that the general sum that will be paid to the Arabs evacuated from the wailing wall will reach I.L.150,000.



EAST IERUSALEM CITIZENS NOT INCLUDED IN ELECTORS BOOK

People living in East Jerusalem are not included in the electors book which will

appear in November, 1968.

Reliable sources in the Ministry of the Interior explained that everyone who isn't included in the electors book has to take the initiative himself. The Israeli government took the initiative to register only Jewish immigrants and Israelis who reached their 18th birthday. Regarding the inclusion of East Jerusalem people in the electors book for the municipality, the sources said that an inhabitant who isn't a citizen and wants (after a year of his staying in the country) to be included among those who are privileged to elect a local body has to declare his will. East Jerusalem people (who aren't citizens) haven't initiated as yet any declaration to that effect. Therefore they are not included in the book.



NEW SYSTEM TO EVACUATE JEWISH QUARTER

(Haolam Haze 10.7.68)

Jerusalem's police force detained this week a number of Arabs who arranged a sit-in with their families opposite a tractor that was ready to demolish a part of the buildings in the Jewish quarter in the old city. The police explained to the sitters-in that if they did not stop their efforts of protest they would be expelled to the East Bank.

The threat was effective but created a great embitterment among the people of the old city, who were regarded (so the authorities claim) as Israelis and even

have identity cards.



MUSLEM LEADERS PROTEST

(Haaretz 14.7.68)

The Muslem leadership in east Jerusalem sent a petition last Friday to the Prime Minister complaining about the

archaeological excavations near southern wall.

They claim in the petition that the expansionist tendencies of the excavations are dangerous. They complain that the excavations are too near to El-Aktza Mosque. The petition notes that the leaders of the Muslem religion met two months ago with Professor Mazar who is the leader of the archaeological team and he explained the excavation plans. The petition states that the excavations are "dangerously" near to the Mosque and the number of the labourers employed has doubled.



DISTRIBUTION OF VILLAS

IN FAST JERUSALEM

(Haaretz 17.7.68)

Jews who registered for the Many villas in the region of Mivtar-Hill are complaining about delays in the distribution of plots. The complainants note that every one of the 1,300 registered people had paid I£ 1,600 to the authorities. No lottery has been arranged since and no interest has been paid for the money The officials responsible for arranging the distribution of the plots explained that the classification of the candidates and the creation of criteria for the distribution of the candidates to privileged groups takes time. It is in the hands of a public committee. After the committee finished its work some of the registered people who were not included in the pool applied to the court.



SCHOOLGIRLS SHOT IN GAZA

(Zu Hadereh 17.7.68)

Shots were fired on a demonstration of schoolgirls from the Dir-El-Balan College in Gaza strip. Five schoolgirls were wounded. It became known later that a leg of one of the wounded girls, Shefa Ali Abu-Saker, was amputated.



"FOOD FOR LABOUR" IN GAZA

(Haaretz)

A new plan-food in exchange for labour-was put into practice this week in Gaza and Sinai by the military governor and the American company Care. According to this plan, every head of a family will get employment for a quota of days each month and in exchange for his work he will get food for his family instead of money.

In the first stage 6,000 families will benefit from this plan and in the future it will extend to 10,000 families.

SANCTITY OF PRIVATE PROPERTY

(Haaretz 20.5.68)

Sir,

The Israeli press has recently reported various activities by individuals and organisations concerning private Jewish property in Hebron. Individuals and organisations intend to realise this property, monetarily and politically. Some scek actual profits; others, consolidation of their claims for annexing the occupied territories by colonisation, to the extent of full integration into Israel. Some of the Jews who inhabited Hebron during the turn of the century, as well as the group which now stays at the Park Hotel there, have already started to move in this direction. They all pretend to be successors of the entire old Hebronite community.

As a descendant of a family which has inhabited Hebron continuously for the last four centuries and as the sole heir of the famous Rabbi of Hebron, Chaim Bejaio (mentioned in Haaretz on 13.4.68 as one of the three custodians of the Jewish community's property there), I herewith declare that I have nothing to do with these activities. Anyone pretending to speak on behalf of the entire Hebronite community is misleading the public. Anyone planning colonisation is herewith forbidden to do so on my land.

I shall demand the realisation of my ownership rights when the ownership rights of the Palestinian Arabs over their property in Israel are realised. This approach ought to be respected by all those who consider private property as an inviolable, sanctified right.

Until such day arrives, I herewith permit those who inhabited my land before the Israeli occupation on 5th June, 1967, to go on doing so. I have no claims against them.

In your article on the Middle East, you stated that "Israeli fighter-bombers streaked over the Jordan and pounded Long Tom' gun emplacements near Irbid, a town 12 miles inside the ceasefire line (June 14)." I can assure you that there are no gun emplacements whatsoever near Irbid. In any case, the Israelis bombarded the city itself, which has a population of 100,000 people. They killed or wounded over 100 Jordanian

civilians. You might be interested to know that most of the damage to the city was a result of the Israelis using Russian 130-mm. guns, which were brought up to the occupied Golan Heights especially for bombarding the city.

IS THERE ANY JUSTICE IN ISRAEL?

I was happy to read in the Letters to the Editor (26.5) Mr. Klog's letter opposing discrimination between Arab and Jewish citizens. He was right in his comment that an Arab is punished for burning an Israeli flag whereas the Jews in Bnei Brak who have done the same (and everyone knows their identity) have not been punished.

Mr. Klog's letter was not answered by Bnei Brak municipality or by the Home Office or the police. They simply ignored the matter. The conclusion is that public opinion has no influence on the municipality or on the police. They can simply whistle on the public and its protests.

It is clear that in a country where publicly-elected figures and their officials do not listen to the public, democracy is in jeopardy. And the question is: Is there any justice left in Israel? Is the law the same for everyone or are there two standards of law, justice and morals?

Israel and the World (The New Statesman)

Sir, I am surprised at Amos Kenan's surprise. He is unhappy at finding his country (Israel) and thus, to some extent, himself - in the American camp. But where else could he be? Isn't it rather blind, or deluded or egocentric, to imagine that one can take over a country under the umbrella of a Western mandatory power, Britain, and not have what Mr Kenan calls the Good People against you? After a war in which thousands of Arabs and about 670 Israelis lost their lives, it does seem a little frivolous of Mr Kenan to complain about being banned from Cuba, unable to stroll in the sun-drenched streets of Havana, or toast justice with a glass of champagne. Is he surprised to know that the suspicion that rises in him 'that even the most enlightened among the most progressive people' are still basically anti-semitic has crossed Arab minds as well? Are the Jews really the only people to whose sufferings the world is indifferent? How many people really care what happens to Arabs?

When people start quoting Ecclesiastes it is pointless to criticise them for lack of logic. Mr Kenan's message is clearly not meant for the mind but for the heart. Israel has chosen the logic of force, but struggles, through people like Mr Kenan, to escape classification. It wants the advantages of both wolf's and sheep's clothing. We understand that Israel, deserted by the communist world, desperately needs to retain the loyalty of the European Left. But how can it, when 'if you force me to become a conqueror, I shall become a conqueror. And if you force me to become an oppressor, I shall become an oppressor'? Mr Kenan's advertisement for himself, as a likeable man who used to sit in cafés and sign petitions for the release of political prisoners, doesn't do much to alter the fact that Israel launched a long-planned and devastating attack last June and will undoubtedly do so again the moment the international situation seems propitious. We know Israel's firepower now and have no illusions about its capacity to damage. Will Amos Kenan still be writing in the NEW STATESMAN after the next round? Surely he will. Ecclesiastes is inexhaustible. But if 'existence' means you have to knock hell out of your neighbours every five years, what is the point? What is this but an admission of the bankruptcy of Zionism as a solution to the 'Jewish problem'.

EDUCATION

AGAINST DEMOLISHING HOUSES AND EXPULSION OF LEADERS (Haaretz 19.3.68)

Now, with the bombing of houses in the heart of east Jerusalem and Beit Hanina, public opinion in Israel and abroad against such atrocities has been aroused. Demolishing houses (like the expulsion of leaders from the occupied territories) causes only harm to our case. The question which has to be decided is -as the late Prime Minister Moshe Sharet said once-is Israel governed by law or can the present Minister of Defence do everything as he wishes. The suspects whose houses were demolished were not brought before the court martial and have not yet been convicted. Even if they are convicted in the future, there is neither justice nor advantage avenging

their wives and children and robbing them of their shelter.

As in any other place in the world, the responsibility to protest lies primarily on the intellectuals. It is strange, therefore, that all those intellectuals who published the proclamation headed-" Peace and security-yes, annexation-no" have not raised their voices against this system of demolition and expulsion of leaders.

From the Diary of an -

ISRAELI ARAB

by Fauzi El-Asmar (translated from the Hebrew magazine Ahereth)

The drunken excitement that swept the majority of the Israeli-Jews after the June war also swept the majority of the intellectuals and the majority of those who "s. uggled" during the previous years for Jewish-Arab understanding.

Till the last war there were people who devoted themselves to the struggle against the emergency regulations of 1945—people like Uri Davies, who was arrested for his campaign against the confiscation of Arab land, people like those who published the tamous "Tzipor Hanefesh" in which they denounced the discrimination against the Arabs.

Their voice is silent today. The almost total silence of the majority of the Jewish intelligencia in Israel about the things that are happening now to the Arab community is responsible for the fact that the régime is not hesitating any longer to increase the number of restriction orders imposed on the Arabs.

The régime has put Arabs in prison on the basis of the emergency laws—for periods up to one year, and no one has objected.

The economic situation of the Israeli Arabs; their educational level, which is terribly low; the lack of economic development in the Arab villages; the fact that most of the land was taken away by the Jews; the prevention of any cultural or political self-organisation—these are but a few of the issues that the Arab community in Israel is facing in 1968.

Why is it so? Because the struggle against the persecution of Arabs ceased more than a year ago. It's impossible to find information about the Arabs in the Hebrew press. Newspapers that had printed such information in the past (and by doing so forced other papers to follow suit) are now silent.

Once it was possible—here and there—to read about Arabs who were driven out of their land only because they were Arabs; about a man who was asked to leave a night club because he was an Arab; refused to rent a room because he was an Arab; and so on. Today those things apparently don't happen any more.

But the situation isn't so rosy. On the contrary.

The fate of more than a million people—the inhabitants of the occupied territories—is today in the hands of the Israeli government, and in those occupied territories much more terrible things are happening. In those territories long terms of imprisonment are imposed on people without a trial. Many are tortured and beaten when they are arrested; houses are demolished and the people living there are driven out, expelled. Nothing of all that is happening there reaches our ears. It is not printed even in the newspapers usually called progressive.

Although most of those things are going on openly and publicly and were even published by the Communist press, they are completely ignored by the other newspapers on the pretext that they are communist "horror propaganda." Those descriptions are used without checking the arguments and the facts, facts that were passed even by the pedantic military censorship when they were submitted to them by the communist editors.

Therefore, there exists deliberate abstention of criticism on government negative actions, explained by "self-restraint." This can be explained in my view by two considerations:

The first one is that before the June war there was a feeling in the Jewish community that it's impossible at this time to know the real fate of the State of Israel. A part of the public was even afraid of the future. There were those who did everything to prevent a clash between Jews and Arabs because they were afraid of the consequences.

That's why they asked Israeli Arabs to join them in the formulation and signing of peace proclamations that were sent to important people abroad. That's why they tried to project on every occasion the united struggle of Arabs and Jews for progress and peace.

Today it is not necessary any more. Today they are not interested any more in peace or in justice. There is nothing to

be afraid of. The public today shares the feeling that the Jews can do anything they want without anyone to stopping them.

That's why they think that there is no need today to consult, to share or to ask help from the Israeli Arab.

The second reason is that Zionism succeeded in implanting in every Zionist Jew the feeling of superiority, the feeling that he belongs to the "chosen people" in the perspective of his historical rights to "the whole of Palestine."

To this can be added the educational line which is intended to introduce the Arabs as inferior to the Jews. They say that the Arabs are morally inferior, killers, intellectually inferior, primitive and so on . . This kind of education leaves its footprints in all the Jewish community. "With the eating comes the appetite," and the real wish of the majority of the Jews now is—to keep and hold the occupied territories and to expel their inhabitants. Some people are trying occasionally to cheat the public and they talk about Federation or keeping the territories until "peace comes."

The trouble is that it is necessary to justify somehow this wish to keep the occupied territories—at least in the eyes of the international public.

Here again the beautiful Zionist theory comes into action and explains that they came to preach peace and to bring progress to the region and its people, while the Arabs want only to destroy the Jews (there is no doubt that the Arab propaganda did everything to justify this).

But now there is a new situation. The persecution of the Israeli Arabs and the Arabs of the occupied ter itrales will condemn and expose the real face of the peace seekers and the justice loving people. That's why everyone who has enough courage to raise his voice against such misdeeds is regarded by the Jewish community as a traitor and conspirator who is undermining the security and the peace of the state.

The laws of war impose obligations not only upon military tacticians and field commanders; they assign responsibilities to every soldier as an individual. Acting merely under orders does not constitute an acceptable defence, as reiterated both at Nuremberg and at the Eichmann trial. Whoever executes an unlawful order assumes personal responsibility for the consequences.

These laws are based on a very simple principle: they make unlawful any act of war against non-belligerents. Their detailed provisions follow from this principle and elaborate it; they subsequently change in accordance with developments in the

means and methods of warfare.

It follows that the law protects nonbelligerent citizens of a nation at war. It protects any individual who is not in the armed forces and does not engage in acts of war, including those who can be regarded as potential fighters, and it covers, in general, any unarmed person. From the same principle follow the rights of prisoners of war.

An act of war directed against a nonbelligerent is unlawful even when done under orders. In law, such orders may and must be refused, as responsibility rests with the individual. It is timely to reiterate this personal responsibility of soldiers which is theirs whether giving orders or obeying them.

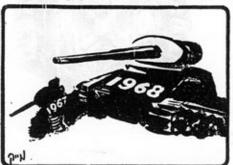

Please accept our sincere thanks for your solidarity and support concerning the arrest and trial of Khalil To'ameh.

We have reason to assume that your response-which was expressed in demon-strations, picket lines, letters and cables, and which was widely reported in many countries-resulted in the sentence being not quite as severe as it might have been.

However, in view of the facts revealed during the trial, and of the reasons given by the military judge, Colonel Alpern, in his judgement, the sentence is still ex-tremely severe, illustrating the draconic character of the 1945 Emergency Regulations according to which To'ameh was

It is especially noteworthy that in his judgement the military judge explicitly says that it was not proved that Khalifa belonged to a terrorist organisation or engaged in violent resistance. According to the judgement, the very fact that Khalifa belonged to a political movement, one of whose aspirations was the "Liberation of Palestine," is enough to make him an enemy of the State; and the fact that he lived in To'ameh's flat (although, as was pointed out, they appeared together openly) is enough to condemn To'ameh to prison.

Thus the decisive fact is the political

affiliation of the "harboured person."

It follows that any Palestinian Arab whose political aspirations or affiliation are opposed to Israel's official policy could be defined as an enemy of the State, and any Israeli citizen who comes in touch with him could be prosecuted and con-demned by virtue of the above-mentioned Emergency Regulations.

It may be assumed that the wider stir in foreign public opinion, as well as the manifestations of solidarity by a part although a small one-of the Israeli public, were among the reasons that the military authorities conducted the hearings openly and even allowed the defendant to appeal against the sentence. In addition, the defence counsel, Mr. Shlomo Tusia-Cohen (one of Israel's best lawyers) has found a legal possibility to appeal against the verdict itself.

But this affair, grave though it is, is but one case—not as severe as others— of repression by the Israeli authorities against Palestinian Arabs, both citizens of Israel and inhabitants of the occupied territories. The "legal" basis for most of these acts are the said 1945 Emergency

Regulations. Dozens, perhaps hundreds of people (the exact number has not been made public) are imprisoned by administrative order, without trial. The Israeli courts have no authority to order the release of such prisoners. There is an increasing number of deportations, demolition of houses (several hundreds!), house arrests and restriction of the freedom of movement-all without trial and by administrative orders only.

We appeal to you to take whatever action you think right (e.g., demonstrations, picket lines, letters and cables to the Israeli authorities) to protest against these repressions and to arouse world public opinion.

Please let us know of any action you take, send us copies of your letters of protest, etc., so that we may publish them here.

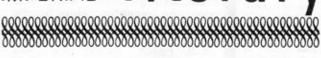

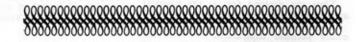

odour. He stood by the shore and said:

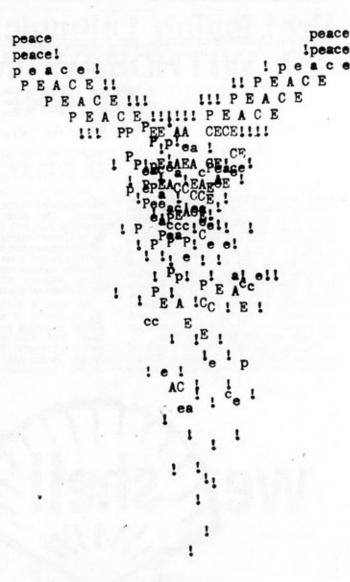

Annexation? It's a catastrophe! To bring large numbers of Arabs under Jewish rule sows the seeds of destruction of the state and the nation - the breakdown of our social fabric. It will destroy our humanity, for in a few years it will be impossible to find a Jewish worker or a Jewish farmer. We will be a nation of foremen, civil servants, police and secret police. It will be a state of secret services, which will drive the social atmosphere insane with pressures on our freedoms: the freedom of expression, of free speech and organisation. The civil service will pay the Arabs and will be paid by them.

The first sign will be in the Municipal elections next years in Jerusalem. Thirty-five per cent of the Old City are now Arabs. We will buy their votes - and they will sell them to take what they can from the foreign regime.

Another aspect of annexation will be the separation of the state from the Jewish nation. The state will have its own problems and will not have any interest in the Jewish nation. The state will work on the organisation of the regime through military power. I am sure that the present situation cannot continue long and that actual pogroms will follow the moral degeneration of the nation.

So, what is the alternative? To quit the occupation of a million and a half Arabs; to return to the status quo of 5 June, 1967. This will be a situation of another potential war and an eternal danger. In the end, I cannot see now or in the foreseeable future any logical answer to the Jewish-Arab conflict. Anyone with open eyes - and there are a few with open eyes in the government, but they prefer to remain quiet - can see that we are going towards a new Vietnam. It is a process of escalation. Tomorrow, maybe, we will have to conquer Amman, for example; the day after tomorrow, who knows where! In this process it will come to a Napoleonic end or, if you prefer, to the fate of the Crusades. There will be no possibility of stopping it. Maybe we will bury ourselves in graves we dug with our own hands.

But maybe we can stop it: In history there are no laws, no events which must happen. I said that today there is no possibility of solving the conflict. Yester-

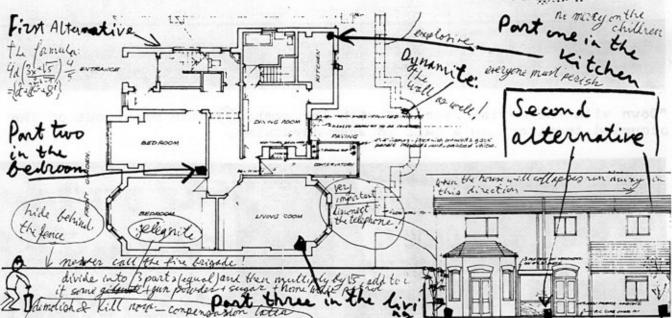

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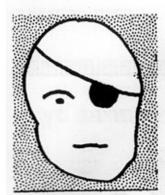
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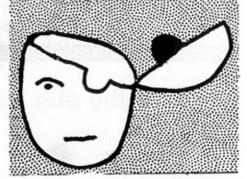

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day maybe there was. But it is a fact that in the last nineteen years we did not make a real try to talk with the Arabs. I must say that there is no guarantee that we could have succeeded. Our oligarchic regime did not think it necessary to talk with them and did not, moreover, even feel comfortable about talking with them. In the case of the Sinai campaign, it is a proved historical crime by Israel and her allies, in which Israel appeared as a hired agent of Western Imperialism without profit to herself. And because of this there is still no possibility of discussion with the Arabs.

If I was Nasser, I would not negotiate. We have no power to press peace on him and we have nothing to offer him in return for peace. The Arabs recognise that our existence depends on the thin line which connects us to the White House, and if in November a man is elected to the White House who thinks that the U.S. has no interest in the Middle East, we are lost. Perhaps the U.S. has no real interest in Israel and we merely benefit from American madness.

What our leadership can offer is, as I have said, to withdraw—as De Gaulle did from Algeria. It was a great thing which lent greatness to France.

It is often said that Israeli public opinion will not stand for withdrawal from the West Bank without conditions and under no circumstances from Jerusalem. But we do not merely have public opinion. There is the confederation of the party secretaries; and if they make a decision to withdraw, we can withdraw. Our country, unlike the U.S., is apolitical. The very fact that they can sit down in one coalition is proof of Israel's being apolitical.

Another myth: the historical right for an Israeli state. With all respect to religion, the nation living in this country has no feelings for the history of the Jewish nation. Is the Wailing Wall holy? All of the country — Eretz Israel — is the holy land, not just the Wall. The Israelis believe only in power and territory, but the Wall has no real significance or power. Further, everything else in our society is just imitations of Western society.

What are our qualities? Is heroism one of our qualities? Excitement from military victories? Hitler had military victories, so did the Cossaks and the Marines; they were "heroes". Heroism is a human quality which proves nothing. History contains many examples of victories by the wrong side. And, just as heroism does not prove quality in man, victory does not prove the rightness of the cause you are fighting for. And really this is the principle of Jewish feelings: Judaism is not pacifism, but it does not care for the value of war and heroism as a measure of

So I say again; our only chance is to stop the annexation. But someone once said that history is hate, catastrophe, and the madness of men. Still, nothing is impossible.
